### **1. Increase Awareness**

There is a movement in Maine to move upstream from the child welfare system to support families earlier and promote collective responsibility for child and family well-being.

#### Maine's Child Safety and Family Well-Being Plan

- A partnership between DHHS and MCWAN
- Developed with families, communities, and state partners
- Informed by data and best practice
- Initial version released in 2023
- 5-year plan released in February 2025




## Together, we can keep children safe by keeping families strong.

- Every child, youth, and family in Maine deserves to live in a supportive community where they can get the help they need, when they need it.
- By supporting families earlier, we can create the conditions for strong families and limit the need for involvement by the child welfare agency.

#### **A Coordinated System**

Improving outcomes will require coordinated and sustained efforts across all levels of the socialecological model. Most of us have a role to play at multiple levels.

- Strengthen specific populations, communities, and neighborhoods.
- Prevents child abuse or neglect before it occurs and prevents the need for initial or deeper involvement with the state's child welfare agency.

### OCFS Child Welfare Division

#### **Tertiary Prevention**

- Services for families where child abuse or neglect has occurred.
- Strengthen families with indicated or substantiated child abuse or neglect, keep families together, and help them heal from trauma.
- Prevents family separation, recurrence of child abuse or neglect, and reinvolvement with the state's child welfare agency.


**Be There for ME** (<u>https://bethereforme.org</u>) aims to reduce the stigma of asking for help and provides a judgement-free website for parents and caregivers to start to find support. The campaign also speaks directly to community members, identifying opportunities for everyone to step up to support parents and caregivers in Maine.

Parents and caregivers were co-designers in the creation of this campaign, its message, and the website.

The website and campaign materials are available in 12 languages: Arabic, Chinese, English, French, Khmer, Lingala, Portuguese, Russian, Somali, Spanish, Swahili, and Vietnamese.

Help Me Grow (HMG) Maine is a free information line linking families and professionals to information about child development, pregnancy, and community resources for children all over Maine up to the age of eight years old.

**Families** can dial 211 option 5 to speak to a Family Support Specialist who will listen, link them to services, and provide ongoing support when needed.

**Providers** can refer families with their permission by dialing (207) 624-7969 or completing an <u>online referral form.</u>





## **Maine Families Home Visiting**

- Maine Families is a free and voluntary home visiting program available for all pregnant people, expectant couples, and primary caregivers of young children in Maine.
  - Eligibility for referrals is pregnant people and children under 3.5 months, but Maine Families can serve children until age 5.
- Family Visitors utilize the evidence-based Parents as Teachers (PAT) model to partner with families.
- Home visiting strengthens families by supporting:
  - Increased knowledge of early childhood development
  - Universal education and screenings for the family around a variety of topics including health, safety, and well-being
  - Early detection of developmental delays
  - Positive and creative learning environments for children that prepare them for educational success
  - Assistance with family goal-setting and resource discovery
  - Social and community connectedness





## Maine Prevention Councils



Created in Statute in 1985, Maine Prevention Councils are the state-designated entities in each county that encourage and maintain coordinated community efforts to prevent child abuse and neglect through the provision of family-strengthening programming, because strong families and supportive communities prevent child abuse and neglect.

The Prevention Councils offer a wide range of services and supports for families and the community, that are FREE, and both in-person and virtual. These can include:

- Parenting education classes
- Supportive groups for parents and children
- Family and parenting resources, and child development information
- Family and community activities and events
- Trainings for professionals

Family First Prevention Services Act of 2018: Provides federal funding for specific evidenced based services for child welfare involved families to keep children safely at home and prevent removal from the home. It also improves the standards for youth needing Children's Residential Care Facility Services.

Only child welfare staff can make referrals to Family First programs: Homebuilders, Intercept, and Parents as Teachers Expansion (provided by Maine Families Home Visiting.) **Access Maine (**<u>www.AccessMaine.org</u>**)** is an online Resource Guide created as part of the FFPSA initiative. The content of the guide includes <u>state level programs</u> that can support and serve families and individuals in Maine.

**211 Maine** is a service directory that provides easy, free, and confidential way to help people find <u>community-based resources</u> that help them stay healthy, safe, and independent. Their contact center is based here in Maine.
